The issue of practical applications had already been a major topic in the early phase of biographical research. In this context the classical studies of Chicago sociology, e.g., Clifford Shaw's "The Jack-Roller" (1930), but also similar studies of social scientists at the University of Poznan (under the influence of Florian Znaniecki) like Stanislaw Kowalski's "Urke Nachalnik" (1933), come to mind. A first interest in a "clinical sociology" (Louis Wirth) emerged in working contexts in which sociologists developed a special interest in the life histories of their research subjects and encouraged and supported them to articulate and to write down "their own story". Life history studies were not just relevant in the context of academic sociological research (in a more narrow sense) but were supposed to enlighten professional practitioners, the public and local elites. At the same time the act of collecting data was marked by the fact that research "subjects" intensely participated as co-workers or even co-authors: They were prompted to actively turn to and reflect about their life history and by doing so they gained new insights. This aspect was more or less neglected in basic theoretical considerations of the early phase of biographical research — as compared with new developments in which, e.g., the creation of knowledge in story telling and "biographical work" (in the sense of Anselm Strauss) become topics of inquiry.

The Nuremberg conference will focus on the practical uses and consequences of biographical research. Such uses and consequences might be intended, registered, surprising, subtle, neglected or just rhetorically invoked or imagined. The idea is to reflect about our studies and to reconstruct what we want to accomplish, whom we want to reach and how we have to deal with restrictions and limitations. Biographical researchers in different countries have gained quite different experiences and specific traditions have developed (cf. the relevance of the concepts of "user participation" and "user empowerment" in the UK and other countries). It will thus be very stimulating and rewarding for colleagues from different European countries to share their experiences and discuss their insights and ideas.

In the last years the topic of practical applications and the applicability of biographical research had been mainly discussed in the context of professional work and education (cf., e.g., the articles in Chamberlayne, Bornat and Apitzsch, eds., 2004). We would like to broaden the focus and invite colleagues who are working on quite different substantive areas to reflect about their studies in terms of their practical uses and consequences. This is just a list of possible topics for our discussion which might be expanded:

- Biographical research for whom: clients, professionals, institutions, social policy makers, the public? How is it possible to deal with possible conflicts of interest?
- The possible tensions between basic and applied biographical research
- The acquisition of skills of biographical research among professionals and the development of settings for acquiring such skills (workshops for reflecting professional practice etc.)
- The application and further development of procedures of data collection and analysis (of biographical research) in professional interventions: chances, risks and limits (in terms of legal barriers, ethical considerations, institutional restrictions etc.)
- The relevance of biographical research for different spheres of activity (counseling, educational support, working with unemployed persons, rehabilitation, therapy, organizational development, medical diagnosis and treatment, counseling of drug addicts, community organizing, supervision, etc.), policy areas (social policy, health policy etc.) and political discourses
- Biographical research and the arts
- Biographical research as a "meta" counseling procedure in order to sensitize professional counseling of clients with regard to their biographical processes
- The influence of funding institutions and officials on different phases and the results of a research project
- Strategies of dissemination of research results in fields of professional practice and their social

arenas

- The relationship with research subjects and processes of creating knowledge in the research process
- Practical applications in early "classical" biographical studies
- Practical implications of different approaches of biographical research (including oral history research)
- Specifics of applied biographical research in different countries
- Arenas and debates in which the usability of biographical studies is contested and defeated or defended

PLEASE NOTE

There will be both **English and German** language sessions. In any case the organizers will do their best to make sure that the bilingual character of the conference will be an asset for all participants, that everyone will be able to participate in discussions and that no one feels excluded.

We invite colleagues from different countries and different disciplines of the social sciences to submit abstracts until 30th April, 2010.

The abstracts should be no more than one page and can be written either in English or German. ESA Research Network 7: Sociology of Culture – Mid-term conference

ASK Research Center Università Bocconi, Milan, Italy October 7-9, 2010

The conference aims to explore the role of culture—the symbolic context in which choices and actions acquire shared meanings -as a medium for building "worlds." Cultures are analyzed in terms of their capacity to help shape the pasts and futures of contemporary societies. They are both ends and means in the society-building process. They establish the terms of engaging injustice, articulating multicultural and multireligional issues, and providing new paths for conflict resolution and peace. They frame our very experience of space and the place in everyday life, as well as individual and collective identities. They provide material for new products, new markets, and new ways of life.

This aim of the conference necessitates an interplay among cultural, economic, political and social analyses. Therefore, the conference will be characterized by an emphasis on interdisciplinarity, to include contributions from economics, political and management science, anthropology, and cultural studies, as well as sociology *per se*.

The conference will be attended by scholars from all over Europe and the United States. The papers will be evaluated through a blind review by the scientific committee of the conference.

The conference will be comprised of the following sessions:

How culture matters

Contemporary societies are characterized by a high degree of complexity, due to several factors, such as the information and communication overload, the extensive migration of people among different countries, the impact of technologies on the organization of everyday life and social interactions, the possibility of rapid travel across the world. For each citizen the probability of getting in touch with "cultural otherness" has become much greater than before. However the "otherness" might be not only a resource, but also a threat. The "stranger", as Alfred Schutz pointed out, can be the vehicle of innovations and creativity, but also the "natural" source of conflicts. In order to face "otherness" in our complex everyday life we need a cultural frame of analysis. We need to respect the autonomy and uniqueness of each culture in itself. Cultures are reluctant to be domesticated, they need to be interpreted.

In this context the study of culture becomes an important resource for conflict resolution, for articulating issues of justice and human rights, for shaping state-building processes, for driving social and economic development, for understanding controversies raised by multireligiosity. Cultures shape the public knowledge of the past, and the public expectations for the future. They shape individual and collective identities. They affect the impact of innovations and social change in communities and institutions, they construct the social meanings of technologies. On the other hand, they create also new "boundaries", new forms of social exclusion and marginality. Cultures are active, and in their *active nature* they are always ambivalent and ambiguous.

How the culture system changes

Cultures are not only "means" in the society building processes. They are also ends in themselves. How does the culture system change in contemporary societies? We are witnessing important transformations due to the increasing impact of new technologies, the increasing role of the media system, which affect the ways in which cultural artefacts can be produced and can acquire their own meanings and values. The creative process undergoes new patterns of production, recognition, distribution and reception. Creative industries acquire a new leading role, both in economics and civil society. The culture and arts systems are affected by new forms of articulation of public discourse, both in different national contexts and in the global arena. In contemporary societies a strong focus on images characterized different forms of cultural production and deeply change the way in which we are conceiving the world. Culture, space and time

There is an interplay among culture, space and time. The way in which we make experience of the world is culturally and historically determined. Space and time are culturally shaped. Several researches in

different countries have documented to what extent the definition of space can differ. The articulation of the space typical of contemporary society is the urban agglomeration, the city. From New York to Tokyo, from Paris to Berlin, from Rome to Milan: these are the forms of the space that "we have in mind" when we think at "our places". Obviously there are many other forms, which do not correspond to the urban conception of space, but they are not hegemonic, especially in the European context. Also the time is conceived very differently across cultures. The linear definition of time, which links the past to the future, and requires to remember controversial pasts in order to avoid their coming back is indeed a specific conception of time, shared by only a part of the world population. The European Sociological Association's **Research Network on the Sociology of the Arts** announces its mid-term conference, '*Great Expectations: Arts and the Future*' to be held:

University of Surrey Guildford, United Kingdom 1-3 September 2010

The Research Network aims to provide the sociological context for understanding the multi-faceted and interwoven social aspects which characterize the artistic world. The theme of the Guildford conference asks us to look from the present to the future, and abstracts are invited on the thematic sessions. The conference also aims to be inclusive and abstracts are also welcome on any topic within the sociology of the arts.

Thematic Sessions:

1. The Future of the Arts.

These sessions will examine such questions as: How might changes in technology change the production and consumption of the arts? How might changes in the social construction of the arts, for instance, the blurring of the boundaries between fine and popular arts, affect art worlds? Might the arts become more or less democratic? Might there be new art forms? If funding for the arts shrinks in the near future, how will the arts fare? Can the arts contribute to sustainability? Contemporary trends may suggest a variety of alternative futures in these and other areas.

2. Children and the Arts.

Children are the future. Their exposure to art today may make a difference to the arts in times to come. 3. Recent Developments in Theory in the Sociology of the Arts.

In order to understand potential future developments, it is necessary to understand contemporary trends. What is new in sociological theories of the arts?

Commemorative Sessions:

The Research Network wishes to offer sessions commemorating the late Professor Richard A. (Pete) Peterson and his influential work. We therefore specifically request abstracts of work that engages with the topics Pete contributed to: arts consumption and the omnivore thesis, the production of culture, arts and policies, and music sociology.

Topical Sessions:

The sociology of the arts is a broad area, united across artistic disciplines and sociological schools of thought by the belief that sociology can inform the study of the arts. We also have an interest in, and usually a deep appreciation of, those art forms we choose to study.

Topics from all areas of the sociology of the arts are welcome, and session titles will be determined so as best to fit the range of abstracts submitted. Sociology of the arts is defined broadly to include fine, popular, folk, commercial, design and street art and the institutions, artists, producers, supporters, audiences and the other organisations and individuals involved with the arts. Abstracts from all social science disciplines, philosophy and the humanities, and from artists and practitioners are encouraged.

It is hoped that there will be sessions on Arts Management, Book Culture, Gastronomie (Food as art), Improvisation, The Market – Is it Artless for the Arts?, and What Sociology of the Arts can say about the Social Value of Art. Submissions on these topics, or on any other, are welcome.



Theory for a Global Age: THE PLACE OF AFRICA?

University of Warwick July 5 – 10, 2010





The Institute for Advanced Study at the University of Warwick is organising an advanced summer school for early career researchers and academics, including PhD students and postdoctoral fellows, on:

'Theory for a Global Age: The Place of Africa?'

The place of Africa within theories of the global is usually present only by its absence. Or, if it is present, then Africa is there to provide local colour to an abstract global theory, theorised from elsewhere. Even within theoretical initiatives that primarily address the world beyond Europe and the US, Africa is very often left off the intellectual map. While it is common to describe what is global about processes observed within African societies, it is rare to describe a global process as African in origin. Nor is much consideration commonly given to the implication for global theories of the foregrounding of Africa within them.

In this summer school, we intend to place Africa firmly at the centre of key debates within the humanities and social sciences. We will ask, among other things, how these debates change if the starting point of analysis is located in Africa itself. Participants will also consider whether there is a conceptual language or theoretical framework for addressing Africa's place in the world. This summer school builds on the summer school run last year on 'Theory for a Global Age: Postcolonial and Cosmopolitan Perspectives.'

The summer school is from **5-9th July 2010** and will take place at the **Wolfson Exchange, Main Library, University of Warwick.** The cost of the summer school is £350 which includes 6 nights accommodation, breakfast and lunch, and all course materials. Travel costs and evening meals are not included in the fee. A limited number of travel bursaries and fee waivers are available on application.

The school is organised around guest lectures, seminars and workshops by faculty from the University of Warwick as well as by invited academics internationally recognised in their fields.

Summer School on Cultural Dimensions of Politics in Europe 2010

Center for Public Policy Prague, Czech Republic July 3-10, 2010

The Prague's Centre for Public Policy (Centrum pro verejnou politiku - CPVP), has teamed up with professors from Poland and UK to launch a Summer School on Cultural Dimensions of Politics in Europe 2010.

The Summer School "Cultural Dimensions of Politics in Europe" is a week long academic program bringing together 30 undergraduate and graduate students of various nationalities and academic backgrounds (political science, sociology, media studies, anthropology and cultural studies, behavioural sciences, gender studies) from all parts of the world to enjoy their summer holidays in the unique academic and cultural environment.

The program is aimed at drawing closer attention to the cultural dimensions of political institutions and processes in Europe (e.g. policy making, political communication, migration and citizenship in the EU).

Despite the high level of welfare in liberal-democratic societies, these societies still question themselves on the meaning of equality, the nature and causes of inequalities, as well as on the kinds of policies that are likely to reduce them. Within the current global context, characterised by rapid movements of people, goods, capital and ideas, inequalities appear to be less tied to specific places than only a few decades ago, and appear increasingly structured along identity axes, such as gender, ethnicity, age, (dis)ability, sexual preference, class.

The key role that identities play in shaping inequality is indicated by the thriving political and academic debates on such concepts as diversity, multiculturalism, integration, intersectionality, autonomy, empowerment and inclusion. These notions have inspired new approaches to equality policies, which today face the challenging task of fostering equality. The great difficulty that equality faces derives from, on the one hand, the increasing recognition of the legitimate existence of 'difference' along multiple identity lines and, on the other, the need to disconnect such differences from power inequalities, thus establishing fairer institutional arrangements for all.

This multidisciplinary conference wants to contribute to the understanding of the causes, consequences and the dynamics of inequality along socio-demographic lines in contemporary societies and of the policies to combat it. It addresses grounds of inequality such as gender, ethnicity, sexual preference, disability, class, and age, as well as their comparison and intersection. Reflecting different disciplinary perspectives, the conference is structured in four streams: the law, public policies, organisations and the life course. The IMISCOE Research Network functions not only as a framework for developing research on international migration, integration and social cohesion in Europe, but also provides training to PhD students in these themes.

The late Maria Ioannis Baganha was a leading migration scholar at the Centre for Social Studies (CES) at the University of Coimbra. She was one of IMISCOE's founding members and chair of its board of directors until she passed away in June 2009. To commemorate her work in the field of migration studies and particularly for the network, the IMISCOE Board of Directors has decided to dedicate the IMISCOE Dissertation Award to her.

Aim

This annual prize will be awarded to the best IMISCOE dissertation in the field of migration, integration and social cohesion in Europe.

Eligibility and requirements

Any IMISCOE member whose dissertation was defended during the 24-month period before the deadline for submission [see below] is eligible to apply for the prize. Applicants must submit:

- a completed application form [see p. 3]
- a 1-page (max. 400 words) abstract
- a 5-page (max. 2,000 words) summary of the dissertation
- a CV (max. 2 pages)
- a letter of endorsement from his or her dissertation advisor/supervisor (max. 1 page)
- two letters of recommendation from researchers who are not affiliated to the institutes where the
 applicant works at the time of his or her application and where he or she defended his or her
 dissertation (max. 1 page per letter).

While applications must be in English, the manuscript can be written in any language that IMISCOE member institutes deem acceptable for PhD dissertations.

Applicants are advised that they must supply a copy of the full dissertation if they are short-listed for the award.

The jury

A multi-disciplinary jury comprises members of the IMISCOE Board of Directors, the IMISCOE Editorial Committee, the IMISCOE Training Committee and IMISCOE members not belonging to any of the aforementioned boards. All members of the jury must declare any potential conflict of interest; jurors cannot play a role in evaluating their own PhD students, candidates from their own institution or candidates with whom they share direct collaborative links (e.g. a joint publication).

Review procedure

The jury will short-list the five best dissertations from the total pool of applications. Short-listed applicants will be asked to supply a copy of the full dissertation. Each dissertation will be sent to two external evaluators suggested by the jury. Evaluators must declare any potential conflict of interest in identical terms to the ones established for jury members.

Under exceptional circumstances (i.e. if no winning candidate is found), the award will not be given. Rejected applicants cannot apply again.

Assessment criteria

Nominated manuscripts will demonstrate a significant contribution to migration and integration studies according to one or more of the following criteria:

- research quality
- new area of research
- methodological and/or empirical innovation
- significant conceptual and/or theoretical contribution to its field
- potential impact for policymakers, practitioners and/or other research users.

Prize

The award's prize is 2,500 euro. There will also be an opportunity to have the dissertation published in the IMISCOE-Amsterdam University Press Research series, subject to IMISCOE Editorial Committee decisions.

Presentation

The award will be presented at the IMISCOE Annual Conference. The next conference will be hosted by the Center for Ethnic and Migration Studies (CEDEM) at the University of Liège in Belgium on 13 and 14 September 2010. Presentation of the award is scheduled for 13 September.
